To the Point

As I write this final message to The Point, having completed two years as president of the Board of Trustees of the Universalist Unitarian Church of Waterville, Maine, I think of The Grateful Dead album cover from 1977: "What a long, strange (and wonderful!) trip it's been." Just two years ago, the church had begun planning on the installation of a lift to replace the wooden ramp (removed this last week!) on the east side of the church.

Finished in the fall of 2019, the lift brought this nearly 200-year-old building fully into the present century without sacrificing its architectural integrity or historical presence. A couple of months of technological tinkering by the lift company and we were on our way into a carefree enjoyment of 2020. . .until March, 2020, that is.

When the coronavirus hit, we, like every other institution across the globe, had to adapt immediately to this alien environment. And adapt we did. For three months, services were pre-recorded and made available via our website. In July of 2020, our services became live and virtual. Committees, the Board and other church groups met virtually, relying on technology of which previously almost none of us were aware. We continued the work of the church.

Property & Grounds

In the absence of traffic through the church during this chaotic year, a small number of improvements were undertaken. Two donated heat pump air conditioning units were installed in Averill Parlors to reduce humidity and increase the comfort of church members. A renovation of the bathroom near the stairs, including a replacement commode and new sink with on-demand hot water heater, is ongoing.

The demolition and replacement of the exterior ramp with a set of stairs is planned. A workday for painting and other opportunities for volunteering will be scheduled later in the summer. *Trip Gander*

Interfaith Council

The Interfaith Council met by Zoom on the second Wednesday in May. Our guest speaker was Chief of the Waterville Police Department, Joe Massey. He spoke highly of the substance abuse program called Operation Hope. This program was funded and has proved to be a wonderful link between those who need help with substance use and the police department. Realizing the police could “not arrest their way out,” Operation Hope was the answer. However, the initial funding has run out and the police department is now in the process of fund raising to keep it operational. This program uses no taxpayer money. The police department is sponsoring a golf tournament in late summer. Please see information here in *The Point* or the *Mid-Week Update*.

Chief Massey also spoke about the Committee on Social Justice and Minorities. Topics include use of force policies.

The Interfaith Council has taken a larger role in helping community members with housing needs. Chief Massey calls this group “The Quick Swat Team.” This team can access many resources and help with especially difficult cases of homelessness and housing insecurity. The majority of those seeking help are single women with children who cannot navigate the web of systems and resources.

One council member voiced the opinion that, contrary to logic, the COVID-19 pandemic has helped the homeless in a positive way! Before COVID-19, shelters were full and funds to help were scarce. During COVID-19, federal money has come from many sources, and this funding has continued so that many more folks are being housed and fed three meals per day. For instance, SNAP benefits and food stamps have gone from about \$125.00 to \$500.00 per month!

25th Anniversary of Welcoming Congregation 1996-2021

1993

No one could have remotely imagined the far-reaching ramifications of participating in a weekend workshop whose goal was training folks to be “trainers of trainers,” certainly not the group of individuals that Rev. Severn brought together with the simple request to “give it a try.” And yet, to a member, the group later described the weekend as “transformative.”

Upon their return from the workshop, the group began to complete the steps required to become a certified Welcoming Congregation. The first in their series of workshops was geared to Board members and committee chairs who were given the big picture about the committee’s goals for our church’s proposed Welcoming Congregation. Subsequent workshops, earmarked for members and friends, were held intermittently for nearly two years, as were Second Hour presentations and open-to-the-public conversations and discussions.

Some of the aforementioned discussions among members were lessons specifically targeted for our RE classes: for younger groups, there were picture-book stories: “Tango Makes Three,” “Say Something,” “What was I Scared of?” Senior RE classes focused on the bullying and isolating of gay or perceived gay classmates at their respective schools. These older students eventually met informally with state Civil Rights Team advisors during Coffee Hour!

1996

In May 1996, the Board voted unanimously to become a Welcoming Congregation. Sections of the church constitution were modified to be more inclusive and an official Mission Statement was approved. Documents were completed and were sent to Beacon Street. We were the third church in the NED to earn this certification.

Given the extensive work we’d done with member-friends to satisfy the requirements of becoming a Welcoming Congregation, our primary energy going forward was directed to other UU churches who came to us requesting that we train their leaders.

We soon became known as *the* church who travelled the state to host “training of trainers” workshops. Indeed, between 2000 and 2006, members of our WC took part in the training of church leaders in Augusta, Allen Avenue (Portland), Belfast, Brunswick, First Parish (Portland), Kennebunk, Norway, Saco, South Paris, Westbrook and Yarmouth.

On the home front, it seemed as though we were always recruiting members, modifying our goals, finding ways to be more “out” within the church and community. We signed on as caterers and greeters at services, hosted Second Hour programs and open-to-the-public workshops; our members presented at UU conferences and met with legislators. We wore pins on our nametags, hung a rainbow flag in front of the church, wrote columns for *The Point* which highlighted LGBT holidays or other bits of information about current events. Along those same lines, we invited local media to write columns about our services when we knew the information would be of interest to the public.

Similarly, we advertised the showing of LGBT-themed movies in Averill Parlors or at members' homes, i.e. "Billy Elliott," "Imagine Me & You," "Birdcage," "Bent" and others. These were viewed by groups and then discussed as part of a Sunday afternoon get-together or pot luck lunch-discussion. We marched in Portland Pride Parades in the spring, occasionally marching alongside EQME or church groups. Our banner, a one-of-a kind panel designed by Hillary Ervin and friends, has stood out each year for its vibrant color and unorthodox pattern. It is over 25 years old, a little worse for wear, a testimony of our church's long commitment to gay rights.

From the start, we sought out speakers for our services, both the "man-in-the-street type" of individuals and professionals from within the central Maine community and state government. Lay speakers, some of whom were members of our church, spoke from the heart of their own experiences, their messages significant for their poignancy and authenticity. The professional speakers (see below) brought context and background about what was happening in the state. They encouraged us to be vigilant and focused.

Beyond the four walls of the church, we extended our support to LGBTQ groups in the area. Welcoming Congregation members met with Waterville school administrators, staff and school counselors about developing a "Safe Zones Program" for gay kids. As a result of this collaboration, a LGBTQ Teen Drop-in Center opened in Averill Parlors in 2011. In April 2012 we were recognized by the NNED with the *Anne Kempers Award for Social Justice*. "The Waterville church was cited particularly for its care and focus to the disenfranchised GLBTQ youth in central Maine"

Our work in the community additionally included attending PFLAG meetings and supporting the work of the Waterville High School theater group, "Waterville Inclusive Community Project." In 2012, our UU church was presented with an Appreciation Award by directors of WICP.

2021

The last 10 years have been less active than the heady early ones. Membership on the Welcoming Congregation team has waned due to not having a minister and coping with the restrictions posed by the pandemic. Advocating for gays is less urgent now given that Maine laws prevent discrimination in housing and in the workplace. Importantly, the passage of *Obergefell v. Hodges* in 2015 assured that gays could marry.

Our focus going forward is about supporting the transgender community. Some progress has been made toward addressing that goal: between 2013- 2019, there have been six services on transgender issues.
